

APPROXIMATELY **41%** (or 87,553) OF VIRGINIA PENINSULA HOUSEHOLDS HAVE BEEN STRUGGLING TO GET BY

Recent ALICE data released in 2020, revealed that 41% of households in our community are living as ALICE or below the Federal Poverty Level, down from 43% in 2018. While we are still trying to understand the full economic impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic on our community, the advocacy

model of UWVP's Community Assistance Network (CAN) has demonstrated that our community has effective resources and services that when braided together, create pathways out of poverty at the household level. Now more than ever, it is so important we each do what we can to ensure these programs and services continue to be available for our neighbors experiencing poverty.
